Reflection

I thank you, Mother of God, ... who are all-beautiful and immaculate. I acknowledge that this Order was born upon your knees.

In this prayer, Mother de Matel evokes imagery from an ancient practice described in the book of Genesis. Abraham's first child, Ishmael, was born (by Hagar) "upon the knees" of Sarah, who then presented the babe to his father Abraham.

This ritual action is the way a wife who could not—for whatever reason—give her husband a child from her own womb, could literally give him one by way of a surrogate.

Similarly, Mother de Matel sees herself as surrogate for Mary in giving birth to an extension of the incarnation. In placing this new Order upon Mary's knees, she acknowledges Mary to be as essential in this extension of the incarnation as she was at the Annunciation.

She consistently makes plain Mary's gift of commitment to her daughters—and us.

Do you want to know how much Mary loves you? She gives you all that she conceived in her heart.

In this acknowledgement lies the seeds of Mother de Matel's oftrepeated counsel to her children concerning devotion to Mary.

Mary, who gave her all in her Fiat; who is mother of the Order; who is mother of us all; who is mother both at Bethlehem and Calvary; whose humility is her glory; whose fidelity is our model and our guide.



THE SOCIETY OF THE INCARNATE WORD

When establishing the Order of the Incarnate Word and Blessed Sacrament, our Foundress, Mother Jeanne Chézard de Matel, envisioned a community experience that embraces not only consecrated women, but also priests and lay people. In the 1970's. Her original vision came back in focus with the establishment of Incarnate Word Associates by congregations in both the United States and Mexico.

Now the final piece of Mother de Matel's inspiration is unfolding in Mexico and Kenya with the initial steps to establish the Society of the Incarnate Word for priests. The Mexico Fr. Faustus Uste branch has been growing since 2012 and presently has four seminarians moving toward Ndenyele, Director permanent commitment. The Kenya branch has offered its first discernment retreat and is of Formation

working towards establishing its first house of discernment/ formation. Presently they have an opportunity to purchase a total of three acres and the beginning of facilities that can provide such a home for these men.

Since the congregations in Mexico have been and are still assisting the Society developing in Mexico, the United States congregations (located in Cleveland, Corpus Christi and Victoria) are supporting the emerging Society in Kenya. Each U.S. congregation has agreed to contribute \$17,000 toward the purchase of this property-both land and housing. The present owner, excited about her property being used for a religious purpose, has graciously agreed to hold the property for our purchase until the end of March.


