## Reflection from Sister Annette JEANNE CHÉZARD DE MATEL NOVEMBER 6, 1596—SEPTEMBER 11, 1670

This month we celebrate the 348th anniversary of the death of Venerable Jeanne Chézard de Matel. Following are some quotes about her from <u>Positio II</u>. (A positio—Positio super Virtutibus—is a collection of documents used in the process by which a person is declared venerable.)



So intense was her zeal for the salvation of souls that she never spoke to anyone, as her directors attest, without inspiring the love of God in them. How sweet, pleasant and spiritual were her familiar conversations, but also how efficacious in obtaining the power and love of the Incarnate Word.

After all we have stated about Mother de Matel, nothing should be astonishing about the fact that during her life there was such an extraordinary esteem for her everywhere she went and that she merited the approval of innumerable people of every state of life.

In the language of her day, Mother de Matel spoke the truths that are now expressed in the Catechism of the Catholic Church: the distinction of each Person, clarified by their relationship; the unity of the Persons, affirmed by their intimate relationship of love.

This unity of diversity seems to be exactly what our world is hungering for today. The beauty of so many different cultures; the enriching variety of personalities; the multiple experiences of racial, ethnic and socio-economic groups throughout history producing a legacy of memories—these and other such considerations can either pull us together or drive us apart.

However, a closer look at the truth of the Trinity shows us what Mother de Matel understood about the Trinity and—by extension—us.

Although we could focus on the differences that clarify the gifts offered us by each Person of the Trinity, these differences only underscore the shared essence of God's divine nature of Love.

Can we do the same for one another? Can we recognize that the differences we see (but perhaps do not always appreciate) are expressions of the one humanity—fragile and vulnerable, yet resilient and enduring?

The answer is a resounding YES. For the Incarnation has drawn our human nature into the Trinitarian life of Love. With such a God, such a unity within diversity is certainly possible.

By the time she died while saying the Name of Jesus in Paris on September 11, 1670, her Order was established in Avignon, Lyons and Grenoble. Just prior to 1793, there were foundations in five provinces, none of which had grown lukewarm nor had turned away gradually, as all human things do, from their original perfection. Undoubtedly, it was due to this fact that hers was one of the first Orders to be restored in 1806.

Sr. Marilyn Springs, a member of the NBSC Board, participated in the National Black Sisters' Conference 50th Anniversary celebration at the Marriot Hotel in New Orleans, Louisiana, July 27-29th. Sr. Teresa Maya. Superior General of the Sisters of Charity of the Incamate Word, San Antonio, attended the celebration to show solidarity between the LCWR and the NBSC. The Conference was created out of a need for Black Catholic Sisters in religious orders to form solidarity in response to the 1968 civil rights movement. The theme of the Conference was "We've Come a Mighty Long Way". During the sessions they remembered the past, celebrated the journey and envisioned a future of hope.

Presence of Love: The Power of Communion" was addressed in three keynote sessions throughout the week. Sr. Teresa Maya, CCVI, opened the days with her reflections on what we are called to for the future of religious life—which is already upon us.

Before the LCWR conference these Sisters also attended a day-long workshop addressing the Ministry of Sponsorship, made available by the CHA (Catholic Health Association of the United States). Presentations included information on the Core Competencies of a Sponsor and Leadership Formation in a Sponsored Ministry.

Sr. Anna Marie Espinosa, attended the NRVC (National Religious Vocation Conference) Board Meeting, the J.S. Paluch Vocation Seminar, and the seminar "Vocations: Toward the Future Together" in Chicago, Illinois, August 18-22. The Presenters were the Most Rev. Frank J. Caggiano, Bishop of Bridgeport, Rev. Ralph B. O'Donnell, Executive Director of the USCCB Secretariat for Clergy, Consecrated Life and Vocations, and Mr. Paul Jarzembowski, Assistant Director for Youth and Young Adult Ministries. He also facilitated a panel discussion of young adults.
